

The Rally will be jazzed-up on Sunday by lively Newcastle street band *Mezze Mundo*. Their mix of great music from around the world will certainly get things buzzing on the show field!



Steam Engines

The first road going Steam Engines were developed from the railway steam locomotives. These became '*Traction Engines*' or '*Road Locomotives*' to distinguish them from their rail-based cousins.

Self-powered agricultural steam engines in Britain were developed to pull a plough instead of a team of horses. However, steam engines proved too heavy in many situations and so worked in teams of two, one each side of a field, powering winches to drag the ploughs across. Fowler and Marshall were two of the big British companies in agricultural steam locomotives.

Steam Engines are an iconic part of British rural history and are always popular with the public. However, these behemoths, often in excess of seven tons, take a lot of maintenance and preservation from their enthusiastic and dedicated owners. Please have a chat with them and learn a little about the fantastic machines they are custodians of...

Tractors

The first 'tractors' were actually stationary engines mounted onto skids or wheeled frames which were hauled into fields to power agricultural machinery. These were later developed into self-propelled 'Traction Engines' or 'Road Locomotives'.

The first recorded 'Tractor' was made by John Charter in 1889. Tractor development in Britain was incentivised by Irishman Harry Ferguson tried to improve on these. Later, in 1920, he developed the three-point linkage attaching ploughs directly to the tractor, not just pulling them behind. Vintage tractors have a huge following in Britain with 'the little grey fergie', the Ferguson TE20 of the 1940s, being one of the most popular. This was the first lightweight and affordable tractor, making them available to smaller independent farmers.

Stationary Engines



Stationary engines, as the name suggests, are engines which are fixed and generally immobile. In the 1800s most 'engines' were of this type and were the power source for most mechanical devices such as pumps, threshers, mills and various types of factory machinery. These engines were initially massive steam engines and then progressed into internal combustion engines, the forerunners of the engines found in many cars today. The first stationary engine was the Savery steam engine, built around 1700, to pump water from mines. Today these engines have a dedicated following of enthusiasts who are pleased to share their passion with you.

Classic Motorcycles

Britain has a long history in the design and manufacture of motorcycles dating back into the 1880s with Edward Butler's self-propelled bicycle called the 'Butler Petrol Cycle'. The Excelsior Motor Company developed motor cycles from their bicycle line in 1896 and were followed by Royal Enfield, Triumph, Norton and the British Small Arms Company (BSA). Today, classic motorcycles have a huge following in the UK and include models from many eras and countries.

Vintage Bicycles

The origins of the bicycle are shrouded in mystery with some sources stating that it was first invented by a pupil of Leonardo da Vinci but this is contested. The first verifiable bicycle was made around 1817 with the



Draisine or Velocipede, a foot propelled two wheeled contraption similar to today's 'Balance' bikes for children.

The 1820s to 50s saw various three and four wheeled bicycles made with cranks and pedals and two wheeled pedal powered velocipedes were apparently built in Scotland. However, the first well known two wheeler was the 'Boneshaker' developed in France in 1863 with pedals directly on the front wheel. This was further developed with a larger front wheel for increased speeds and became known as the 'Penny-farthing' cycle as built by James Starley in Coventry in the 1880s.

The 'safety bicycle' was the fore-runner of modern cycles and at its peak the UK had more than 200 manufacturers such as Raleigh, BSA, Coventry Eagle, Hercules, Sunbeam, Claude Butler and many more...
